Rockets' boys, girls among best

WISCONSIN RAPIDS — There were no championships but still a lot of reasons to smile on the Neenah bus after the WIAA State Cross Country Meet Saturday at The Ridges Golf Course.

The Rockets, ranked among the top Division I boys' and girls' teams this season, remained among the best when the final results were posted.

The Neenah girls placed second to Waukesha North. North finished with 80 points while the Rockets had 118.

The Rocket boys finished third with 152 points, putting them behind Middleton (132) and Hartland Arrowhead (148).

"I thought we could beat (Waukesha North)," Neenah girls' coach Ron Fedenko said. "The tough part was convincing the team of that."

"We ran against them earlier this year in Milwaukee. We lost to them but I think our girls were spooked by the race. It was 4,000 meters (instead of the usual 3,200) and I think that intimidated them a little bit."

Sophomore Christy McCutcheon, in 20th place, was the first Rockets runner across the line.

On the boys' side, Neenah coach Tom Jensen said several of his runners, especially the underclassmen, were disappointed with a third-place finish.

"In a way, for the underclassmen's sake, I'm happy they're disappointed," Jensen said. "Not every team would be disappointed with a third-place finish but they expected to do better than that."

Bret Weyenberg led Neenah with a 29th-place finish.

Appleton East's boys took 16th in Division I.

Among area individual qualifiers, Jamie Juedes of Oshkosh North placed 21st and Shane Dornfeld of Waupaca was 31st. Sean Agger of La Crosse Central won in 15:57.

Wolves' pack takes second

Neenah girls 2nd, boys 3rd

WISCONSIN RAPIDS — The Winneconne boys' cross country team raced to a third-place finish in the WIAA Division 2 state meet at The Ridges Golf Course Saturday in Wisconsin Rapids.

Winneconne, led by Sam Benjamin's 15th-place overall finish, finished behind White-water and state champion Phillips.

The Wolves got another solid team performance, which coach Jerry Selle was counting on.

"All the runners ran on or faster than their usual times and this was a more difficult course," Selle said. "Ted Peterson, who usually runs third, ran second and that's not attributed to Tom (Gregory) running a bad race, but to Ted running a great race."

Benjamin, the Wolves' top finisher at sectionals, again

paced Winneconne, improving his time by six seconds and finished in 17 minutes, 4 seconds.

Peterson finished 35th overall, Gregory was 47th and Chad Casper was 48th for the Wolves. The Neenah girls' team also fared well, taking home second place in Division 1. Waukesha North took first place with 80 points while Neenah finished with 118.

According to coach Ron Fedenko, Neenah felt coming in that it had a good chance at placing in the top three.

"We knew coming in that we had a good team and that we could run with anybody," Fedenko said.

Neenah was led by Christy McCutcheon's 20th-place overall finish in 12:09. Meghan Peterson was 23rd and Julie Olson was 30th for the Rockets.

The Neenah boys' team also placed in the top three, finishing with what coach Tom Jensen called "a disappointing

third place."

Neenah's No. 2 runner, Jay Frater, was plagued by an injury and as a result the Rockets were slowed.

"We're disappointed," Jensen said. "Our No. 2 runner was injured and finished sixth on the team. I'm proud of the runners, they did a good job, but injuries got us in the end."

Fond du Lac's Adam McCullough finished 16th in the boys' Division 1 race. McCullough, a junior, crossed the finish line in 16:29, which was four seconds better than his sectional time.

Berlin sophomore Julie Harn

finished 26th out of 109 in the girls' Division 2 race with a time of 12:43.

"It's her first year out for cross country," Berlin coach Dave Reich said. "I think she was happy to be in the top quarter. She finished just ahead of a tight pack and that helped her. I think the move to 4,000 meters next year is going to help her. She's more of a distance runner than a sprinter."

Shelli Kleist from Weyauwega-Fremont finished in 12:52, placing her 39th in the girls' Division 2 race.

Strong finish: Neenah, SMC run well in state meets

They didn't win any championships, but Twin City cross country teams turned in impressive performances at weekend state meets.

The Neenah girls produced the highest finish with a second place in WIAA Division 1 state competition at Wisconsin Rapids.

The Neenah boys came in third in the Division 1 race, while the St. Mary Central boys collected a fourth place in Division 2 at the WISAA state test at Kenosha.

Waukesha North, which trailed the Rockets in the final state coaches association poll, won the girls' championship with 80 points.

The Rockets were second with 118, and La Crosse Central, ranked No. 1 in the state poll, was third with 132.

Runners are placed according to their overall finish and their finishes in team competition. The overall group takes in runners whose teams didn't qualify.

Neenah's overall and team finishes, respectively, included Christy McCutcheon 20th and 10th; Meghan Patterson 23rd and 12th; Julie Olson 16th and 30th; Karen Schaper 60th and 30th; Sara Codner 65th and 42nd; Krista Ericksons 69th and 45th, and Missy Klabunde 115th and 88th.

Olson and Schaper are juniors; Patterson, Erickson and Klabunde,

sophomores, and McCutcheon and Codner, freshmen.

The second place finish was the Rockets' best since 1984, when they also were second. They also claimed a second place in 1980 and won the title the next three years.

The third place by the Neenah boys was their best finish since 1975, when they also garnered a third.

Middleton won the meet with 132 points, followed by Hartland Arrowhead 148 and Neenah 152.

La Crosse Central, the state's top-ranked squad, placed seventh with 168 points.

Junior Bret Weyenberg led the Neenah finishers with a 29th place overall and 13th among the teams.

Other places included senior Tyler Schultz 37th and 19th; senior Tuffy Knoch 46th and 25th; sophomore Ryan Freund 67th and 43rd; junior Justin Bricco 76th and 52nd; junior Jay Frater 79th and 55th, and junior Rhett Weyenberg 127th and 100th.

"I think we were the best team there. We have beaten Middleton and Arrowhead, but it's hard to win when two of your top runners aren't at full strength," said Coach Tom Jensen.

Rhett Weyenberg missed two weeks of practice and Schultz worked out little last week because of injuries, Jensen said.

"You don't get many chances to win state championships. I'm proud of the kids and I think we would have won had we been at full strength. Hopefully, this will motivate the ju-

niors for next year," Jensen added.

Lakeside Lutheran of Lake Mills took the WISAA Division 2 crown with 35 points.

Defending champion Stevens Point Pacelli accumulated 78, Mount Calvary St. Lawrence 80 and St. Mary Central 128.

Phil Dachelet led the Zephyrs across the finish line with his 10th place finish.

Ryan Pociask was 12th, Tony Popp 14th, Kris Putzer 37th, Joe Borszich 63rd, Adam Kane 64th and Adam Krause 72nd.

Dachelet and Popp are seniors; Pociask and Borszich, juniors, and Putzer, Kane and Krause, freshmen.

"It was pretty exciting. We beat conference champion Roncalli and Eau Claire Regis, who was tied with us in the state rankings," said Zephyr Coach Jim Murphy.

"We had a transition year. We had four freshmen running in the conference meet and three at state. The young guys developed quickly and took spots away from the older boys," Murphy added.

Murphy noted that Dachelet's time was better than in 1991, when he finished second, and, as a team, the overall time was better than the second-place squad of 1990.

The St. Mary girls fielded an incomplete team but Liz Rather finished 29th, Tiffany Halfmann 61st, Jennie Kraus 62nd and Katie Roth 72nd.

All are underclassmen.
