

# Expectations running high for NHS team

NEENAH - How many boys at Neenah High School relish running 5,000 meters, or 3.2 miles?

Apparently 54 of them.

That's the number of athletes who joined the NHS boys cross country team this year.

"We have the largest team in the history of Neenah High School," said head coach John Morgen. "We are very, very excited about that."

Traditionally, Neenah has been a power in boys cross country, finishing first or second in the Fox Valley Association in nine of the last 10 years and qualifying for the state meet in four of the last five years.

The Rockets, driven by a strong senior class, again have high expectations this year.

"We looked at the schedule, and there really isn't any meet that we consider ourselves out

of," senior Jason Miller said.

"We have a strong team," added senior Justin Michalkiewicz. "We always have plenty of guys coming out. We have the depth that other teams might not have."

Only eight runners on the team qualify for a varsity meet, however, so the attraction figures to go beyond winning, particularly when athletes have so many other opportunities before them, including strong NHS football, soccer and volleyball programs.

Morgen thinks he has the answer to the increasing participation.

"They are having fun," he said.

Morgen goes to great measures to create a sense of team

and belonging among the runners.

In each of the last five years, he has taken the team on a four-day retreat to Camp Onaway near Waupaca to prepare for the season.

The boys train in the morning and then participate in team-building exercises in the afternoon. The activities include canoe races, obstacle courses and swimming relays.

Forty of the 54 runners gathered at Onaway this year. Participation is voluntary.

"It's just a good opportunity to get to know the guys, not only as athletes but their personalities," Michalkiewicz said.

The team also has pasta parties and runs a football from the campus of Neenah's homecoming opponent to Rocket Stadium. This year, the team will carry the football from Appleton East High School.

The Rockets have handled the best in the state with satisfying results this season, but Morgen said nothing will come easily in the boys race at Countryside Golf Course in Kaukauna.

Neenah won the title a year ago with an impressive 22 points, but has the exhausting task of becoming just the second team since 1996 (Appleton East) to repeat as FVA champion.

Oshkosh West, Appleton North and Kaukauna have won some big invitationals this year.

Morgen said. "Like every other team we want to win the conference. It's been difficult for any team to repeat as FVA champion. That's ultimately our goal."

Jason Miller has been steady all season for the Rockets, while Nick Westphal, who was their No. 5 runner last season, will be heavily counted on to finish in the top five. Miller finished second to Max Garza of Oshkosh West at conference last year.

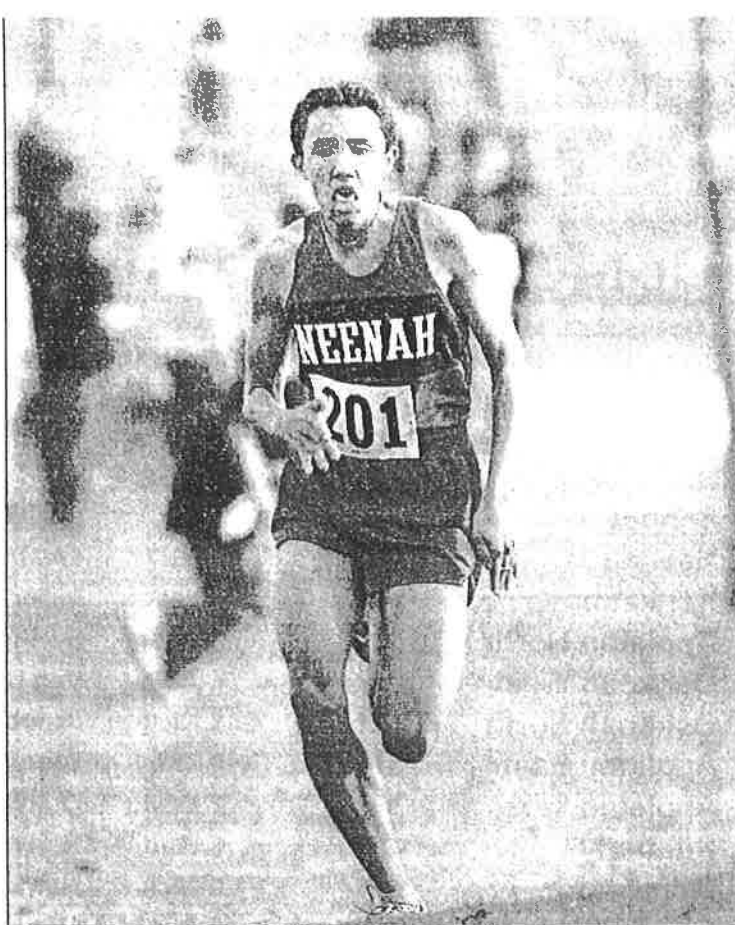

# McDonald, Westphal lead Rockets to FVA cross country titles

As opposed to recent years, this season's Fox Valley Association Cross Country Conference Meet at Country-side Golf Course in Kaukauna was treated well by Mother Nature.

Although the last two conference meets were held on cold, blustery days, this year was different as light jackets and sweaters replaced the parkas and winter hats on the bodies of spectators and waiting runners.

The near-perfect conditions played right into the Rockets' hands as the talented boys and girls teams were allowed to focus on the competition instead of keeping warm, and the results reflected that.

In the first varsity race of the day, the Neenah boys squad left little doubt as to who was the best team in the conference, finishing with 23 points to easily outdistance second-place Kaukauna's 80 points.

The Rockets' Nick Westphal blasted his way from third place midway through the race all the way to first as the junior set a blistering pace over the final 2000 meters to claim the championship.

Westphal completed the course in a time of 15:48 to finish 15 seconds

ahead of second place. That second-place finisher was teammate Jason Miller, who had a time of 16:03.

The Rockets went on to sweep the first three places as senior Adam Swanson earned third in a time of 16:17. Sophomore Tim Burns was sixth and senior Justin Michalkiewicz was 11th to complete Neenah's roster of five qualifying runners.

"I was feeling pretty good today and I was hoping to finish first, second or third," Westphal said. "At the two-mile mark, I started to really go for it. I was running with my teammate Jason Miller and that really helped. He has been a great teammate and a great mentor this season.

"I am very proud of our team today. We ran a very good race. One of our goals this season was to win the conference race and we did that. Our team is ready for the sectionals and hopefully we'll make it to state."

Westphal's win continued his solid running this season, a key for the Rockets' squad.

"Nick had been one of the reasons for our success this year," Neenah boys coach John Morgan said. "Last year, he came on strong at the end of the season and was our fifth-place runner in the conference meet, but

he injured himself in that race and his season was over.

"For him to climb into being one of the best runners in the area has just been a huge boost for this team. As a result, we've been able to compete with some of the best teams in the state this season."

In the girls varsity race, all eyes were on Neenah's Betsy McDonald as the senior looked to be the top candidate to win the championship after two straight seasons of placing second behind former-Kaukauna runner Brooke Novak, who now runs for the University of Tennessee.

McDonald didn't disappoint as she broke open a close race after 2000 meters to win in convincing fashion.

McDonald raced away from Kaukauna's Christy Cazzola and Fond du Lac's Tara Hinke at that point to control the second half of the race en route to an 18-second victory over Cazzola.

"This is definitely a great feeling to win," McDonald said. "I actually felt like I was hitting the wall when we started the second lap, but I was able

to pull together knowing that I had trained hard for this race.

"I didn't come into this race thinking that I was going to win. I knew it was going to be some very tough competition and that it was going to be a battle. I feel like my hard training really paid off."

After McDonald, Cazzola and Hinke crossed the line, the focus turned from the individual battle to the team battle.

The Ghosts captured fourth and fifth place to total 13 points after three runners, while Neenah's Emily Burns was seventh and Jill Winkler ninth to give the Rockets 17 points.

But, Neenah freshman Andrea Stier delivered a 12th-place finish to put Neenah a leg up and Becky Ray crossed the line in 20th to give Neenah a final total of 49.

Kaukauna placed second with 54 points and Appleton East was third with 75.

Next up in cross country will be the Division 1 sectional meet, which will be held at Lake Breeze Golf Course in Winneconne on Friday at 3:30 p.m.

Participants at sectionals will be all of the FVA schools, as well as host Sheboygan and West Bend schools. Manitowoc and Plymouth will round out the schools in attendance

**KAUKAUNA** — There's no better feeling after winning a cross country race than turning around to see teammate after teammate approaching the finish line right behind you.

Neenah's Nick Westphal and Betsy McDonald got to experience that joy Thursday, making their days even more delightful.

Westphal's victory in the boys 5,000-meter race and McDonald's triumph in the girls 4,000-meter event helped lead the Rockets to a sweep of the team titles at the Fox Valley

Association championships at Countryside Golf Club.

"It's awesome. Our plan was to score 1-2-3," said Westphal said who finished with a time of 15:48. "Our team has worked so hard this year."

"We truly deserve what we ran."

The fourth-ranked Neenah boys lived up to their design as Jason Miller placed second in 16:03, followed by Adam Swanson in third place with a 16:17.

Westphal, who was Neenah's No. 5 runner last year as a junior, said he couldn't have improved as quickly as he did

without the assistance of Miller, who finished second at conference last season as well.

"He's helped me a lot and I really appreciate his guidance this season," Westphal said. "I was trying to run with him (this season). He really helped me through a lot of it."

"For him to jump from a fifth runner to be one of the best runners in the area has been a boost for this team," Neenah coach John Morgen said.

Neenah totaled 23 points, well ahead of second-place Kaukauna with 80, to repeat as conference champion — the

first team to do so since Appleton East in 1996.

Oshkosh West's Nick Hawley and Ross Martin finished ninth and 10th, respectively.

For McDonald, it was finally a chance to break out from the shadow formed by former Kaukauna star and 2000 state champion Brooke Novak.

"(In previous years) you didn't want to go out there, 'Oh yeah, I'm going to get second,' but there's kind of that assumption because Brooke is great runner," said McDonald, who

Also placing in the top 10 for the Rockets was Jill Winkler, who took 10th in a time of 15:23.

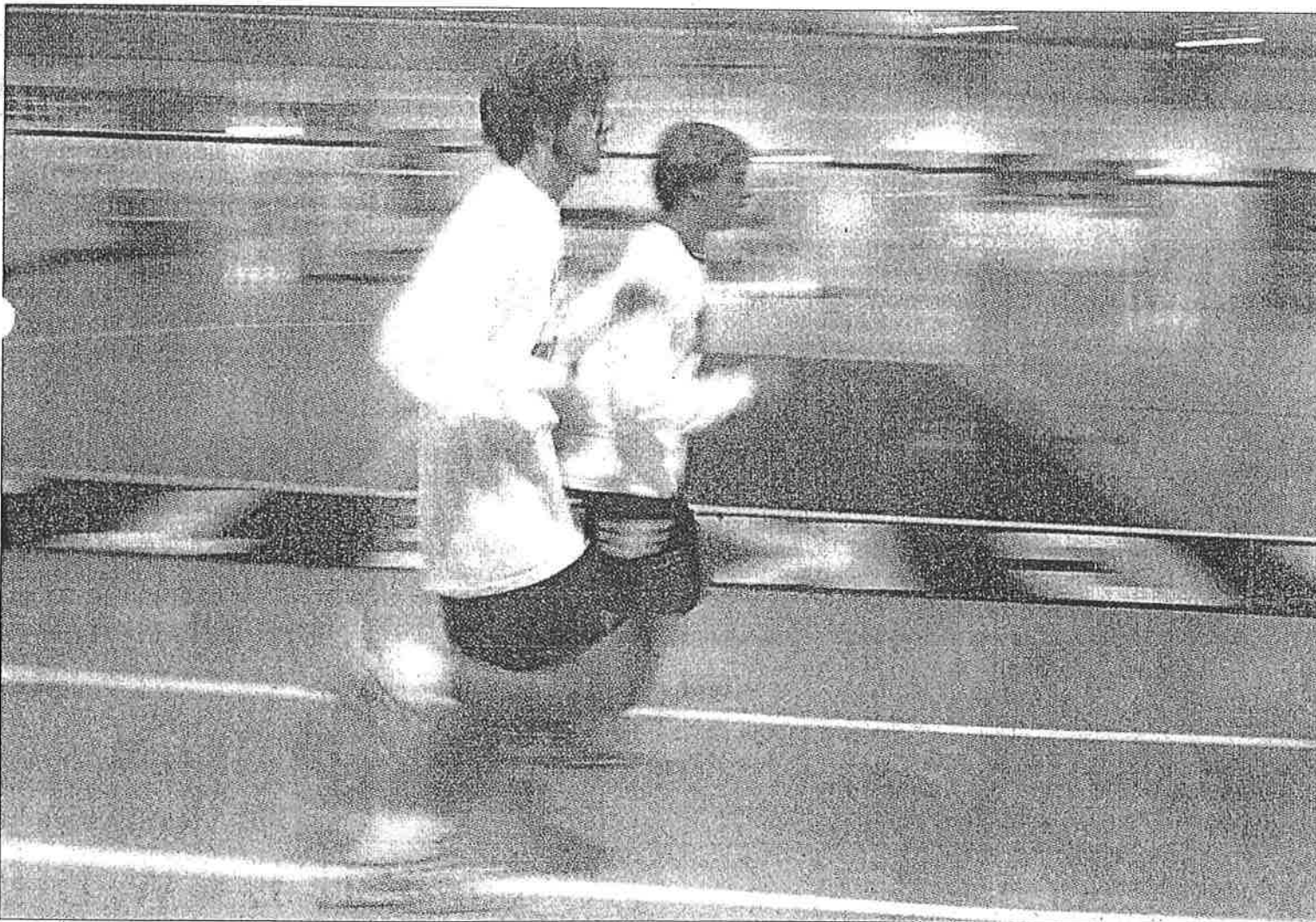
