

It was Neenah's second victory in seven days, following a win at West Bend last Saturday.

"I was very pleased with their results," Rockets coach Mike Heidke said.

"We're not really doing any speed work right now, (just) building up strength, (running) a lot of very fast times. I'm very pleased with where they are so far this season."

Neenah also outpaced defending state champion Wausau East, which won Division II on Friday but ran in the same race as the Rockets.

"It makes it more exciting to race against a powerhouse," Heidke said. "I think we raced a little bit harder today because of that."

A year after winning the meet, Parker finished second to a runner from Wausau East.

"She got away in the woods a little bit and I couldn't catch her," Parker said. "She probably got me by about 100 meters at the end."

Neenah boys' coach John Morgen was just as pleased as Heidke with his team's second-place result. The Rockets lost to Marquette and beat out another top team, Stevens Point. Those three teams finished among the top four at state last

Rockets runners perfect

Neenah girls take top five spots to win own meet

NEENAH — A rainbow, large and multi-colored, lit up the eastern sky over Memorial Park not long after the girls' varsity race at the Neenah Cross Country Invitational ended on Friday.

Just like the perfect rainbow, the Neenah girls were perfect in their race.

Led by sophomore Alison Parker, the Rockets scored a perfect 15 points to win the Division I competition.

year.

"Everyone's stepping up this year after we lost five of our top seven (to graduation)," McDonald said.

after winning the Appleton West Terror Invite.

"I think we have a real strong boys' team," Papermakers coach Mike Heling said. "I was really pleased."

The young Papermakers girls' team took second behind Wausau East in Division 2.

Kimberly has three freshmen and two sophomores on varsity.

"When I first saw where we were in the race, I thought, 'Whoa, we're pretty far back,'" Heling said. "Then I realized how fast we were running and the competition we were against."

"We're real young. They're just getting a feel for things and the senior leadership is really stepping up."

It's a Rockets runaway

Neenah boys, girls take titles

KAUKAUNA — In a sport in which performance is judged by the clock, the timing couldn't have been worse for the Neenah boys' cross country team.

The Rockets learned the hard way shortly before the start of Thursday's Fox Valley Association meet that

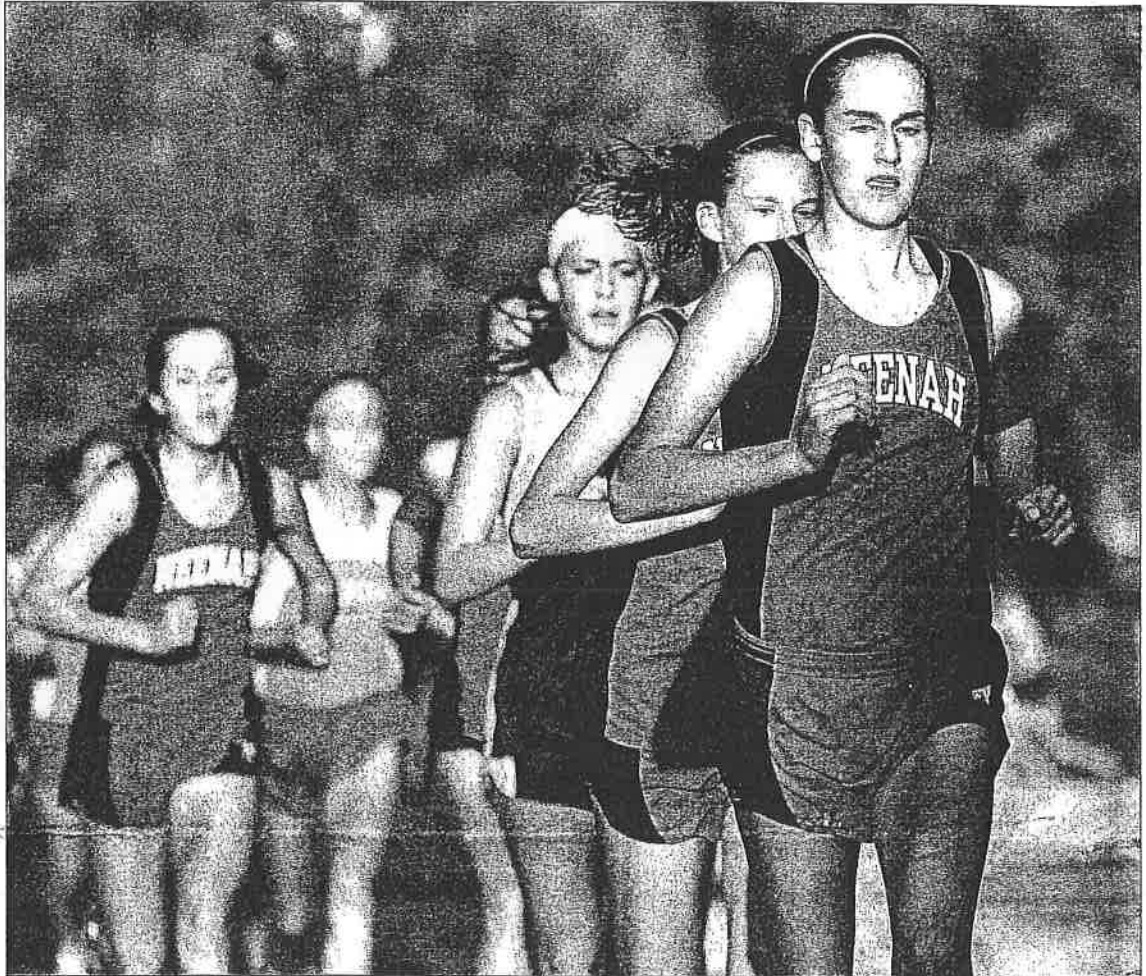
Inside No. 1 runner Robbie McDonald would miss the event with a trained leg tendon.

That didn't take the zip out of a deep, talented Rockets team.

Neenah placed three runners in the top eight and overcame McDonald's absence to win its 15th FVA title with 53 points — 22 better than runnerup Kimberly.

The Rockets made it a clean sweep at Countryside Golf Course by breezing, as expected, to the girls' title. Neenah had the top four finishers in the 1,000-meter run, led by medalist Alison Parker, and just missed a perfect score with 17 points.

McDonald made the decision to not run after resting the leg prior to the meet. He is expected to be ready for next Friday's Division 1 Oshkosh West sectional at Lake Breeze

"We didn't really know until about an hour before that Robbie wasn't going to be able to go," said Neenah boys' coach John Morgen. "I was so proud of the way the kids responded. Considering the circumstances, it makes this championship even more special."

The boys' 5,000-meter run was a thriller. Oshkosh West's Sam Penzenstadler overtook Appleton East's Dan Schubert with about 60 meters remaining and edged him at the finish line to win the race in a personal-record time of 15:28.20.

"It could have gone

either way, but I had a PR, so I'm happy," said Schubert, the runnerup at 15:29.41. "I had the lead by about five meters with about 200 meters left, but he has a real good kick."

Penzenstadler nipped Schubert in another close race earlier this season.

Cross country teams ready for postseason

Rockets have good chance to qualify for state

Just call them Rocket-powered.

That might be the best way to describe Neenah's first-rate boys' and girls' cross country teams.

The stretch run of the WIAA cross country season has arrived and both Neenah squads are approaching the finish line with a closing kick.

Neenah raced to separate boys' and girls' team championships at last Thursday's Fox Valley Association meet and both squads enter today's WIAA Division 1 Oshkosh West sectional at Lake Breeze Golf Club with a good chance of qualifying for the WIAA state meet.

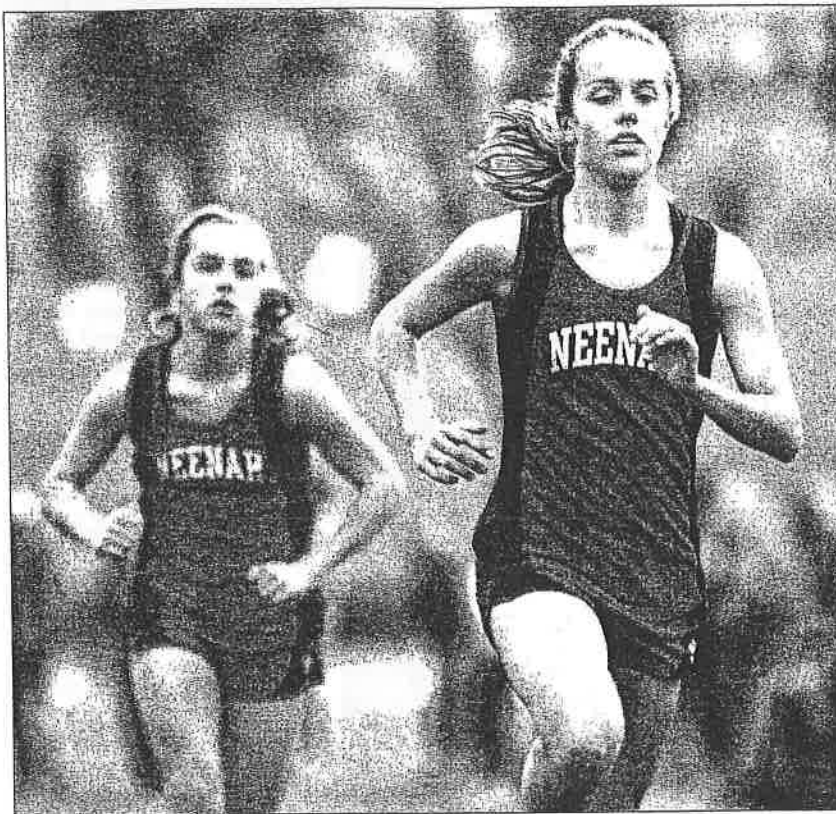
The top two teams and first five individual finishers (not on a qualifying team) will advance to the state meet Oct. 30 in Wisconsin Rapids.

The Neenah girls' team was a third-place Division 1 finisher at the 2009 state meet, while the Rocket boys' squad placed fourth.

Both enter today's sectional in high gear after winning last week's FVA meet.

Neenah breezed to it's the girls' conference championship with 17 points — just two short of a perfect score. The Neenah boys' overcame the loss of No. 1 runner, Robbie McDonald, to capture the boys' title with 53 points — 22 better than runnerup Kimberly.

The Neenah girls had the top four finishers in the girls' 4,000-meter run led by sophomore medalist Alison Parker with a win-

ning time of 14:41.62. Parker finished second at last year's FVA meet at a freshman behind Kaukaun's Megan Stenz.

Neenah's Claire Knaus (14:54.62) was the girls' runnerup, while Jessica Parker ((15:05.83) and Jennifer Parker (15:06.88) took third and fourth, respectively. The Rockets' Austin Anderson (15:27) was seventh.

"Being conference champ was one my goals going into the season," said Parker. "My time for the first mile wasn't great, but I picked it up after that. It's pretty amazing that we had the top four finishers. This is a great team, Everyone works hard."

It was the second straight FVA title for the Neenah girls, who have been the state's top-ranked Division 1 team all season.

"Based on times I knew we had a chance to have the top four finishers," said Neenah girls' coach Mike Heidke. "But you still have to go out there and run. I thought we were very solid and consistent."

Neenah placed three runners in the top eight and overcame McDonald's absence to win its 25th FVA title. Michael Borland sparked the Rockets with a fifth-place finish at 16:17.74. Tim Kilas (16:23) and Ryan Schmidt (16:31) were seventh and eighth, respectively, while Jacob Schultz (16th, 16:58) and

"We only have one runner (Kilas) back from that team that finished fourth at state last year, so I'm really proud of this team," said Morgen. "Michael (Borland) and Tim (Kilas) have been here all year for us, and Ryan (Schmidt) really stepped up for us. To win a conference title against good competition without your No. 1 runner, well, that's overcoming a lot of adversity. That's why this is even more special. Depth won it for us."

Oshkosh West's Sam Penzenstadler was the boys' medalist, overtaking Appleton East's Dan Schubert with about 60 meters left and outracing him to the finish line to take the race in 15:28.20 to Schubert's 15:29.41.

Neenah's boys' and girls' teams and the Little Chute and Freedom boys' teams each will be looking to make a statement.

Neenah's girls, who finished third in 2009, head to the state meet ranked first in Division 1, while Neenah's boys, who finished fourth, are ranked sixth.

Important to the Neenah girls will be not getting caught up in all the emotion and hoopla.

"We just have to run our best, work as a team and just don't go out too fast," Rockets sophomore Claire Knaus said. "Just be smart."

Neenah junior Michael Bourland said, "Last year, we were fourth, so this year, we're trying to do the same thing, if not better. If we did well at sectionals without our best runner (Robbie McDonald), we should be able to make a statement at state."

That's where the depth of the Neenah team will come in handy.

"You're really starting to see the fifth and sixth runners move up," Neenah coach John Morgen said following the sectional meet. "That's what you really need to be competitive at state. I feel we've run against all the best teams in the state, so they shouldn't be overwhelmed by the experience or the competition."

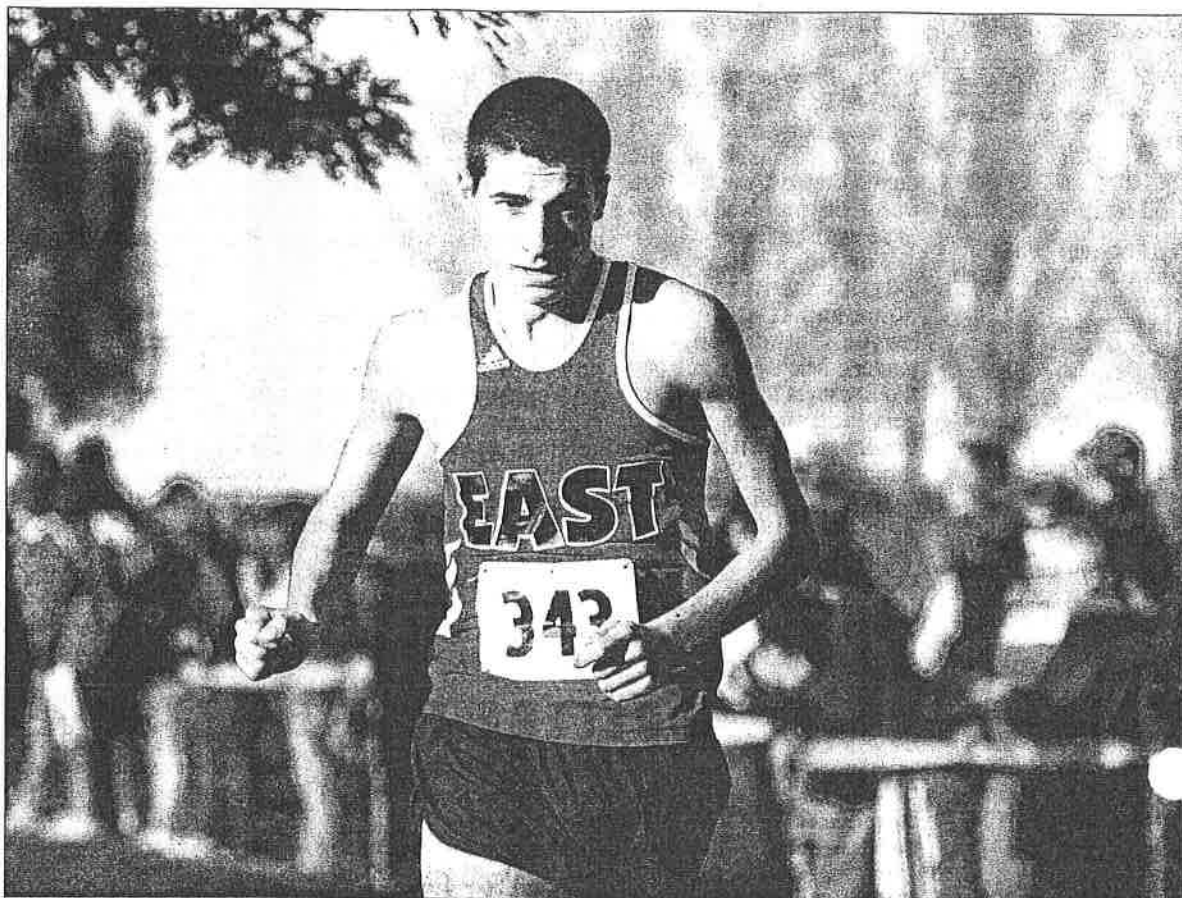
WINNECONNE — Free of injury, Dan Schubert is back where he was headed a year ago — to the state cross country meet.

Schubert was trying to finish the 2009 FVA meet when he broke his leg.

"I had a stress fracture that I was unaware of," Schubert said. "I just had some leg pains (before the fracture). It broke in the last 400 meters, so that was disappointing."

Schubert had to watch as the Patriots, who were undefeated during the regular season, finished 11th at state. Then came the road to recovery.

"I definitely paid a lot of attention to my leg," Schubert said.

"I wanted to get healthy and I did some physical therapy. I got back to where I was (before the injury), so I'm happy."

Schubert was one of a few area success stories at the sectional meet. Both the Neenah boys' and girls' teams won sectional titles,

and a pair of local girls, Rachael Weber of Appleton North and Erin Fischer of Appleton East, advanced to state individually.

The top two teams and the top five individuals who were not members of those teams qualified for the state meet, which is next Saturday at Wisconsin Rapids.

The Neenah boys placed five runners in the top 13 to cruise to the title with 41 points, easily outpacing Fond du Lac with

104. It was an impressive showing for the sixth-ranked team in Division 1 especially because the Rockets' top runner, Robbie McDonald, had to sit out again.
