Rockets receive congratulatory phone call from Morgan

Rockets overcome adversity to capture cross country title

KAUKAUNA — The Neenah boys' cross country team came into last week's Fox Valley Association meet without its No. 1 runner.

But the Rockets overcame the absence of Andrew Christiansen to win its seventh FVA championship in 10 years.

Neenah, which was led by junior Kaiser Behnke's fourth-place overall finish, won the meet at Countryside Golf Club with 60 points.

Fond du Lac was second with 86 points, while Appleton East was third with 95.

Christiansen is sidelined with mononucleosis and hopes

to return for the state meet if the Rockets advance through Friday's sectional at Winneconne.

"We laid it out before and it actually came out the way we laid it out," said Rockets coach Mike Jovanovich, filling in for longtime coach John Morgen, who is serving with the U.S. Army in Iraq.

"We probably had 80 percent of our kids run PRs (personal records) today. That's what it's about."

Appleton North senior Elliot Krause defended his Fox Valley Association championship by obliterating the meet

record.

Krause finished the 5,000-meter course in 15 minutes, 14 seconds — 25 seconds faster than Appleton West's Brett Burt ran the same course in 1982.

Behnke (15:38) also beat the course record.

Winning the title wasn't the only thrill for the Rockets at last Thursday's FVA meet.

The team also received a cell phone call from Morgen, who heard about the good news about Neenah's championship.

"That's great. Great job by everyone," Morgen said as the entire team gathered around the phone to get a word in edgewise.

"That was very special to get that call," Jovanovich said. "We've e-mailed back and forth, but that's the first time I've talked with him since he left (in June)."

The Neenah girls' team also had a solid showing in the FVA championship, finishing in third place.

Vienna Behnke, who finished seventh overall, was the top runner for the Rockets.

Neenah runners excel with coach in Iraq

Jovanovich steps in until Morgen returns home

NEENAH — Being the head coach of the Neenah High School boys' cross country team has been a positive experience for Mike Jovanovich.

But he won't be in charge for long. In fact, Jovanovich is looking forward to stepping aside after the season and becoming an assistant coach again.

That's because Jovanovich is filling in this season for John Morgen, the wildly successful, personable and popular coach who is serving a tour of duty with his National Guard unit in Iraq. "I'm just trying to keep the ship upright until John gets back," he said.

And Jovanovich is doing just that.

The Rockets — led by top runners Andrew Christiansen and Kaiser Behnke — are in the midst of another outstanding season. The team has performed exceedingly well in invitational meets against some of the top cross country teams in the state. And the team — which has qualified for 10 of the last 11 WIAA state cross country meets — is on track to peak in the postseason.

"I picked up a great program," said Jovanovich, who is being assisted this season by Kurt Krueger and Jason Olson.

Christiansen has led the way for the Rockets, emerging as one of the top runners in the state. The senior won the 27-team Marquette Invitation-

record by 19 seconds. He also won last weekend's Midwest Invitational in Janesville.

"He is very dedicated and he did all the work he needed to do in the off-season," said Jovanovich.

Behnke hasn't been far behind Christiansen.

The junior finished third at the Marquette Invitational and outran all of Madison LaFollette's state championship runners in the process.

"He's got a big heart," Jovanovich said of Behnke. "He doesn't like to lose."

Christiansen said Behnke has developed into an outstanding runner. "Almost all of the guys I was worried about beating (at the Marquette Invitational) he beat as well. He definitely established

Joining Behnke and Christiansen this year as varsity runners are Matt Houston, Chris Parker, Tim Schraufnagel, Josh Dederling, Robbie McDonald, Derek Fahrenkrug, Jackson Gruse and Tom Fine.

While Morgen has been missed by the team, the runners have rallied around Jovanovich. And they have stayed in touch with Morgen via e-mail and the Internet.

"It's definitely hard to fill coach Morgen's shoes, but I think coach Jovanovich is doing the best he possibly can," Christiansen said. "I think it's about as good as it can get without coach Morgen."

Morgen keeps track of the team over the Internet and

sees and hears, according to Jovanovich.

"John is always positive," Jovanovich said. "He is always encouraging. He knows that by the end of the year, the kids will run well."

"He misses it. He wishes he could be here in person. Every team and every year is special and you have memories from each and every year that are irreplaceable."

Christiansen said that while Morgen is in Iraq, his presence is still felt by Neenah's cross country runners.

"Everything we do and the successes we have mean a lot more when we think this is what we are doing for coach Morgen," Christiansen said. "We're just hoping he would be proud of us over here."

Young triathlete making some great strides

In the 1980s, when a triathlete was fast or what some might call elite, the saying was: "He's an animal."

Times have changed, and so have the clichés.

These days, when an athlete is fast, you hear: "Wow! He's smoking."

That's just what this up-and-coming athlete does.

At the age of 26, Jason Olson just keeps getting better and better. In an intense, highly competitive field last Sunday at the Pewaukee Sprint Triathlon, he placed high in the overall rankings with a screaming time of 1:02:30.

Yes, that is smoking.

Raised in Neenah, Olson began his athletic career around the age of 13. He said he started with a simple running routine of a mile with his good ol' dad, Scott.

At 14, he entered a local triathlon rather half-heartedly, but this first triathlon became his most memorable.

He said he was amazed at the fast guys and felt fairly inferior as he peddled a bike that looked like a dinosaur, including knobby tires. The young athlete was so intrigued with the fast guys that he soon took a job at Gear 'N Up Bike Shop so he could finally afford a real road bike.

Then two very kind, older and seasoned triathletes, Jim and Lanine Boldra, took Olson under their wings. Their love of the triathlon became contagious.

"Little did I know back then, this was the beginning of a sport that consumes me," Olson said. "I love it."

As a rising star, this is the year Olson wants a real challenge, or what some might call this: "plain craziness."

He has registered for two Ironmans that are relatively close together, meaning little recovery time. They are the Ironman Louisville on Aug. 26 and Ironman Wisconsin on Sept. 9.

To prepare for his duo Ironman season, Olson contacted Mike Pierson, owner of Your Training Zone, to have a lactic acid step test done. He said Pierson has taught him how to train properly.

"In the past, I would always train and race without a plan, so I wasn't getting better very quickly," Olson said. "With this new training, I notice my bike and run time has

already improved significantly.

They typically say your peak for triathlons is 35, and I am currently 26, so that is another nine years of improving."

The other main improvement that Olson feels he made this year is in the swimming. He works with a known swim coach in the

bikes, Olson joined the cross country team at Neenah High School.

He went on to run for the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. He admits he was never quite good enough to qualify for nationals, but so much spring training left him in top condition for the summer.

Quickly, college track season became his training for triathlons. This gave him the jump-start into the triathlon season because he then had to train for only two sports: swimming and biking.

Olson soon found himself winning local triathlons from Minneapolis, Winneconne and Wausau to Fremont.

"As I started to improve, I targeted bigger races as my new goal," he said.

Sure enough, the Ironman Madison became his goal in 2003.

At the age of 26, Olson has completed six Ironmans.

He admits he hasn't shattered any records, but every year he does the Ironman with his father and younger brother.

Jokingly he claims, "Now, if I

could just get my mom to do

These classes are an obvious help as Olson's swim place at the High Cliff Half Ironman went from 10th overall in 2006 to 16th in 2007. The biggest benefit of improving the swim is that he can now get out of the water closer to the leaders,

So beware of this local kid from Neenah who has worked hard to trade in his knobby tire bike for a new one. He will impress you with his attitude of steady confidence, patience and hard work and, I would add, remains

quite humble.

When asked how he kept up such a peak performance season, Olson said: "It seems I'm just off to a decent start."

Neenah senior runs away from pack

Christiansen cruises against elite field

Some of the best cross country runners in the state compete in the Marquette Invitational each year, so a thrilling dash to the finish between a few state-caliber runners wouldn't seem unlikely.

But on Saturday, Neenah senior Andrew Christiansen emerged on top of a hill at Washington Park, just 200 yards from the finish line, with plenty of breathing room between himself and second-place finisher Bill Jones of Milwaukee Marquette. Christiansen finished the 5,000-

meter course in 15 minutes 41 seconds, and Jones turned in a time of 15:56.

"I was pretty comfortable the first mile, and I thought that a lot more guys would be up there with me," Christiansen said. "I won't say that the first mile was conservative or anything, but I was feeling good."

"(The meet) is a very good test because you have a lot of the top teams and individuals in the state here.

Whether it's good or bad, it's nice to know where you're at."

Added Jones: "I didn't want to go too hard. I went with the competition around me. (Christiansen) didn't really lengthen his lead by that much, but he just kind of stayed ahead. I think the lesson learned is that after the first mile, no matter what, I can afford to

(surge and) stay with the leaders."

Madison La Follette, the defending WIAA Division 1 state champion and top-ranked team in the latest cross country coaches' poll, had an equally dominant team performance. The Lancers, led by fourth-place finisher John Prusynski (16:03), placed four runners in the top 10 and won with a score of 40 points. Marquette was a distant second with 59.

"The season has been progressing really well for the guys, so we felt pretty confident," Lancers coach Brady Nichols said. "We've been trying to get everyone to race well at the same time, and this is probably the closest we've gotten to how we envision our team to look. We were really trying to see how we could run as a cohesive team."

Said Marquette coach Jim Kearney: "What we really want to accomplish in this meet is to get as many really good teams here as we can. It's a good test for absolutely everybody. Workouts can tell you so much, but it's the competition that really defines who you are as a team."

Girls: Kenosha Tremper sophomore Sarah Ball certainly didn't mind the mild weather Saturday morning. The native of England, who moved to Kenosha three years ago, outpaced the field over 4,000 meters in 15:25. Waukesha West's Katie Swilaski was second (15:32).

"Today was my best race," Ball said. "I haven't been running well lately. I've had problems with my breathing in the hot weather. But it's a bit colder today, which suits

me."

Waukesha West had enough runners for two teams, and both were impressive. The Wolverines' entries finished in first place (42 points) and second (51). Neenah was third with 79 points.

Winning a matter of seconds — and fifths

Later finishers key to titles by Kimberly girls, Neenah boys

BUCHANAN — At cross country meets, the leading runners get accolades. Those back in the pack usually just get tired. It's that pack, however — mostly faceless except to their parents and teammates — that makes all the difference on whether a team wins or loses a title, such as at Thursday's Fox Valley Association championships at Countryside Golf Club.

"Every year, I tell the story of us at state in 2001, when our No. 5 runner had a bad day," Neenah boys' coach Mike Jovanovich said. "Our No. 7 runner had a big day and finished as our fifth-best guy and passed a kid right at the end, and we won the state title by one point."

Those last passes all count, as each team can field up to seven runners, with the first five scoring points equal to their places. On Thursday, an inexperienced Kimberly team found out just how important every runner can be.

Fond du Lac put three runners in the top 10, while the Papermakers had only two. Kim-



Fond du Lac put three runners in the top 10, while the Papermakers had only two. Kimberly's fifth and sixth runners were in 22nd and 23rd place, ahead of the Cardinals' fifth runner, who placed 31st. The result? The Papermakers won their first FVA girls' championship with 57 points, while Fond du Lac came in with 61.

That meant that a runner on one team passing just two girls and a runner on the other team being passed by two girls would have changed the standings.

"I just know every point counts, so the further I get up there, the better our chances are," said Kimberly sophomore Stephanie Hietpas, the Papermakers' No. 5 finisher Thursday. "I try to pick off as many as I can right before the end."

Some runners start fast and some start slow, but coaches emphasize that over the last 500

meters, it's not what's left in your legs, but rather what's left between your ears.

"That's what we've been telling the girls all year," Kimberly coach Mike Heling said. "We run as a team. Everybody counts."

That's easy to say before the race, but when one's lungs are searing and legs are dragging as the finish line nears, making a last push takes an extra effort.

"You basically have to pull from the crowd and push ahead," said Neenah sophomore Erik Hofferber, whose 16th-
